

## Cancer can be very stressful

People with cancer deal with:

- Feeling sick during treatment
- Worrying about the future
- Having lots of medical appointments
- Money problems
- Sometimes being a long way from home

This is why people with cancer are at higher risk than other people of getting depression, anxiety, or experiencing other concerns about their emotional wellbeing.

### Cancer affects the whole family

When someone gets diagnosed with cancer the whole family is affected. Sometimes the person with cancer feels they have let people down because for a while they can't keep looking after the family like they usually do.

## Caring for someone with cancer is stressful too

It's hard to watch someone you love go through cancer, and it's hard to manage all the day to day jobs to get someone through treatment.

# The Psycho-Oncology Service at Calvary Mater Newcastle can help

The Psycho-Oncology Service is a team of Psychologists and Psychiatrists. We offer one-on-one counselling sessions to people who have cancer.

We also offer counselling to people who care for or love someone with cancer who is being treated at Calvary Mater Newcastle. We help people to look after themselves emotionally, so that they can keep caring for their family.

# Aboriginal Hospital Liaison Officer (AHLO)

Margaret Whitson is our Aboriginal Hospital Liaison Officer. Her role is to support you and your family.

#### How much does it cost?

This is a free service. Calvary Mater Newcastle is a public hospital.

# How often is a person offered appointments?

This depends on what's going on for the person, but it's usually once a fortnight or once a month.

You might be able to book your appointments with us for days when you are already at the hospital for other appointments.

#### How to make an appointment

To get an appointment to see us, either:
